The home is now made up of six rooms (including four bedrooms, a spacious living room, a studio and an office), a mezzanine, kitchen, bathroom and a shared courtyard. The renovation process started with the colours that surrounded her. "My inspiration was the apartment: we used botanical colours for the kitchen (which overlooks the courtyard), for the rooms on the north side of the home we used warm hues and neutral tones for the ones on the south," says Myriam.

"When we moved in, it was a relief for the upstairs neighbours," says Dominique. "But the lady downstairs decided to leave. She preferred dogs to children and disapproved of the fact that we put our furniture and plants in the courtyard."This was a blessing in disguise, however, as the family is now able to enjoy a child-friendly outdoor space filled with tomatoes and lemon, fig and orange trees.

A quick survey of the apartment reveals a wealth of details that tell the ongoing story of Myriam's creative life. "My style comes from my professional experiences and travels," she says. "Working in movie and theatre staging – where I had to invent a whole decor with a small budget within a very short time – was a great experience." This apartment has been an opportunity for Myriam to bring together years of ideas that she has collected along the way. "I don't think my taste and style has changed much over the years," she says. "There must be some of my childhood spirit in all of it, I suppose."

When asked to describe her style, she ponders and then answers, "Essentially a jumble of objects and furniture collected from various places or created by me. A permanent disorder skilfully maintained, a constant experimentation of colours and fabrics, and a clever system of multiple benches and adaptable rooms to welcome our friends' families."The apartment is a true curiosity cabinet. Rough mingles with smooth, soft with hard and old with the not-so old. Glamour is mixed with informality and functionality: the faded and scratched objects only serve to highlight the memories they carry with them.

Myriam has artfully arranged her cherished knick-knacks to produce a sense of lived-in warmth. The overall effect is a strong imprint of personality within the home, creating a joyful antidote to a world of relentless très chic. •:•
